The building is 1884, and we assume the organ is concurrent with the building.

The organ is built in its own chamber. The case is just a façade.

A good quality instrument; rather a lot of sticking keys through lack of use and from some dampness in the building, but would rebuild well enough.

Tonally very nice, especially the Great Diapason and Principal.

Worth preserving.

Dimensions

Width 9' 10" (Case front – organ behind it is a little less)

Depth from back case, about 6' 6"

Height about 15'

The organ has not been played for some years because there has been no-one to play it. It is now redundant because two churches have amalgamated, and their new building is almost ready. Last services in this building are in September 2008, and the church is worried that, because of the area, vandals will be in to smash up the organ as soon as it is left in a disused church.

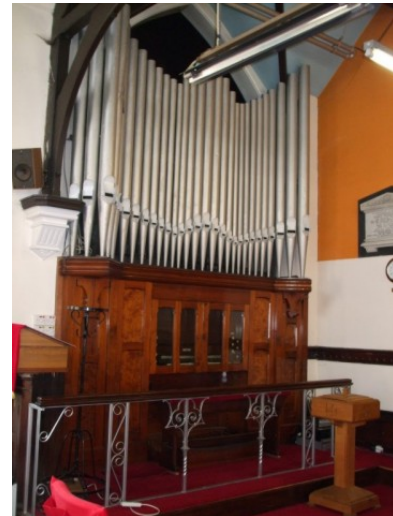
